## A MESSAGE FROM CAITLIN CRAVEN, CHAIR OF MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE & JESSICA BONILLA-DAMPTEY, DIRECTOR

Dear friends, supporters, and community members,

Our 2022-2023 year marks 47 years of SACHA support, advocacy & organizing alongside survivors of sexual violence and their supporters in the City of Hamilton! This is not a small feat, especially amidst the unfortunate closure of various agencies, which will prove devastating for communities. We hear the impact on our crisis support line and in counselling sessions, we see the impact as we engage in community outreach through our Public Education and Diverse Communities Outreach Programs, we feel the impact as our programs and services continue to be high in demand and our waitlists increase. We know survivors are reaching out more and more to receive services and we will continue working hard to advocate for increased funding so that all survivors have access to the timely supports they deserve. As such, we thank City Council for its support and for echoing the calls of the Cities of Kingston, Muskoka Parry Sound, Kitchener Waterloo, the Town of Whitchurch-Stoufville, and the Town of Aurora to show their commitment to Survivors of Sexual violence by writing a letter to the Provincial government advocating for increased and permanent funding for our center.

As we returned to in person services, we were excited to return to an in person Take Back the Night that brought back the march, had all four lanes of traffic available for participants to take up, and one that welcomed and included people of all genders! This was truly a historical TBTN, that in its 41 years of existence continues to be a space that demands safety for all peo¬ple and now also prioritizes an intersectional understanding of sexual violence and street harassment, by ensuring that voices of all genders are included and feel safe and wel¬come to march and reclaim space. We were joined by over 800 people throughout the event that culminated in the best TBTN march we have had. We are enthusiastic for what is to come next year!

Thank you to our volunteers, community partners, and donors. Thank you to our community for always showing up! We all have a role to play in ending sexual violence and as a community we will get there.

We are pleased to offer you the following highlights of SACHA's work with survivors and within the community for 2022/2023:



## DCOP

The Diverse Communities Outreach Program seeks to develop programming for survivors of sexual violence across Hamilton who often have to navigate many systemic barriers and oppressive structures. This can include oppression of all forms, lack of access to services due to language barriers, precarious housing status, class, disability etc. Through the DCOP program, we have collaborated with service providers across Hamilton to put on events, we have provided groups workshops, tabled at events all across the community and offered 1 on 1 advocacy to survivors in Hamilton.

### During this last year we hosted:

- Sewing Circle for Muslim Women in Shelters
- Hosted a Black History Month Coffeehouse with the Hamilton Center for Civic Inclusion and the Disability Justice Network of Ontario
- Hosted a writing workshop for International Women's Day
- Created a Zine with residents living precariously and folks accessing shelters spaces across Hamilton
- Spoke on a panel about how COVID and increased access to technology can transform the work of Sexual Assault Centers
- And more!!

## **PUBLIC EDUCATION**

This year SACHA's Public Education Program shifted back to including in person speaks regularly in addition to continuing to offer virtual options. This also meant an increase in opportunities to table at events and grow our community interactions and awareness of services. Over this fiscal year we received a larger volume a speak requests for smaller audiences but on more specific and specialized topics that all for good opportunities to center the use of an anti-racist, anti-oppressive framework when supporting survivors and working against sexual violence. In total Public Education facilitated 45 speaks with 1014 participants. Another trend we noticed in our work this year was an increase in requests to consult on polices around sexual violence. This has contrivuted to our recent work in building stronger partnerships with school boards and post-secondary institutions that we are hopeful will lead to more opportunities for direct education with youth and awareness in the coming years.

# CRISIS SUPPORT PROGRAM

In 2022/23 SACHA's Crisis Support Program had 2013 contacts with survivors and their allies on the 24-Hour Support Line, and 104 contacts on the WebChat & Text support Service, now in its second year of operation with a limited number of weekly shifts.

This was a year of volunteers' lives picking up post-COVID, and of staffing changes on the 24-Hour Support Line. In line with labour law, we have changed our system for shift coverage, with staff now responsible for work hours; our dedicated volunteers have adjusted to covering the line after-hours. Volunteers continue to be an indispensible part of the Crisis Support Program: a total of 46 trained crisis support volunteers gave 9,078 hours this year, supporting survivors and each other, building community, helping to improve the program, receiving in-service training, and, significantly helping to screen, train and onboard new volunteers.

#### From Caller's Feedback:

"I needed to cry. I was embarrassed to do so but the person on the other end let me know it was ok. I cried with her just listening to me and telling me that I wasn't alone and she was listening and keeping space for me for almost 45 minutes. I really needed that cry, thank you."

"I know I have someone to listen to me when I need it. You are the only line that takes me seriously and does not make me feel like I am being judged or rushed off of the phone because what I am saying is not important."

# COUNSELLING & ADVOCACY

## **Individual Counselling**

Our counselling team which consists of 2 full-time and one part-time counsellors offer services to anyone 16-years and older who are survivors of sexual violence and looking to work on healing. This year we completed 171 intakes and removed 111 service users from our waitlist and provided 662 hours of counselling services.

## **Group Counselling**

We provided two different groups in 2022-2023 both were open to all genders, one where participants were 30 years old or older. One group focused on Navigating Intimate Partnerships and the other one was You are not Alone which was a group for adults who experienced childhood sexual abuse.






## SEX-TRAFFICKING SURVIVOR COUNSELLING PROGRAM

The Sex-Trafficking Survivor Counselling program is SACHA's newest program. SACHA received funding in 2021 to begin this program. Our part time counsellor started in January 2022.

STSC offers counselling to anyone age 16+ in Hamilton who has previously experienced sex-trafficking.



It has been a beautiful experience to see TBTN continue to grow in many ways. This included an official change to make the event open to all genders.

Another wonderful change to the event included extending the community gathering prior to the march and hosting the first ever TBTN Indigenous Market!

We also had a huge community presence represented in the tabling portion of the event with over 40 tables present from services and grassroots organizations.

In total we had over 600 community members participate in TBTN 2022!


